

# Addressing a Challenge and Meeting a Need

In June 2000, Rev. Daniel Ndimantang, a Cameroonian attending



Westminster Theological Seminary located in Philadelphia and his wife, Rose, met with Bob and Jayne Dambman, former missionaries to Nigeria who are employed in suburban Philadelphiaschool districts. Bob is a technology education teacher and Jayne, a school library media specialist. The Ndimantangs explained the pressing need for a vocational school in their home country of Cameroon, a Sub-

Saharan country located in Central Africa. Daniel's explanation included telling that many of the country's youth are underprivileged and most are

without employment. He went on to say that Cameroon had a very pressing challenge to overcome because 80% of their young people were not receiving education after primary school. This situation is causing the population of unemployed young people to explode along with the ensuing effect of an increase in crime and violence.

In 2002, a team of four Americans, Bob and Jayne Dambman and Mike and Joanna Andrews, went to Cameroon on an exploratory trip.



They met with leaders of government, education, churches, and with missionaries serving there. The four different groups unanimously voiced that a fully-equipped, well-run vocational school where young people could be taught trade skills while being educated in academic, business, technology, and the Bible is what the young people of Cameroon need. The leaders also expressed their enthusiasm about how trained and educated young people would be better prepared to

respond to life's challenges, making it possible for them to help enrich their respective communities.

As a result of the trip findings, Comprehensive Vocational Academies International (CVAI) was incorporated in 2003 as a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization. The Board of Trustees chose Cameroon to be the first CVAI

largest city in Cameroon. In 2005, Fon Angwafor III of Mankon, a Cameroonian Chief, embraced the concept with a generous gift of 16 acres



of strategically located land. Shortly thereafter, Missionary TECH Team sent an architect to do a site layout and create a Christian

Comprehensive Vocational Academy Master Plan. In 2006, Missionary TECH Team produced a scale model with all the recommended buildings in place.

When completed, Christian Comprehensive Vocational Academy will be a co-educational boarding school with an enrollment of 900 students who continued on page 4

come from all parts of Cameroon. The Academy will have a dedicated, knowledgeable, and qualified teaching staff made up of both Nationals and Missionaries. The students will be educated for five or seven years depending on the level of national exam they take. They will be taught a full array of academic subjects and humanities including French and English, Bible, art, music, business, math, science, agriculture, and computers. During their first year, they will study introductory vocational subjects before choosing their core vocation. Initially, the five core vocations will be Sheet Metal and Welding Technology, Fashion and Fabrics Design, Electronics Technology and Repair, Electrical Technology, and Home Economics.



When a student graduates from Christian Comprehensive Vocational Academy, he or she will have been taught the truths of the Bible, well-trained in a particular vocational skill, and prepared to be a responsible citizen who works with diligence and integrity.

The first academic year is scheduled to start in September 2009. Therefore, building the campus and starting the Christian Comprehensive Vocational Academy is a high priority and a very urgent need. Gifts from individuals, families, churches, businesses, and foundations are starting to come in to help meet the need. However, Christian Comprehensive Vocational Academy is a huge undertaking and a venture-in-faith that calls for many new ministry partners to join the CVAI Cameroon Team, a caring and compassionate Team that God will use to help make it all happen on a timely basis.



### Cameroon

Cameroon is the world's 53rd largest country with a population of approximately 17,795,000 that is almost evenly divided between urban and rural dwellers. The population is predominately young with an estimated 41% being under the age of 15. The official languages are French and English.

The size of Cameroon is 475,442 square kilometers (183,569 square miles) which is slightly larger than the state of California. This Sub-Saharan Central and West Africa country is bordered by the Atlantic Ocean and neighbored by the countries of



Nigeria, Chad, Central African Republic, Equatorial Guinea, Gabon, and the Republic of the Congo. Cameroon is often referred to as "Africa in Miniature" because it has all the major climates and vegetation of the continent: coast, desert, mountains, rainforest, and savanna.

Fon Angwafor III of Mankon donated 16 acres of prime and strategically located land for the Christian Comprehensive Vocational Academy in Cameroon. The value of this generous gift of land is not included in the above Budget Estimates. #### **Budget Estimate Notes**

**Note 1:** The above Budget Estimates are in US Dollars and are generally accepted estimates based on information received by CVAI for the various costs of construction in Cameroon and an overall range of probable costs.

**Note 2:** Due to fluctuations in currency conversion rates, inflation rates, and any unexpected circumstances and/or expenses encountered, the final costs may be somewhat higher or lower than the budgeted costs.

**Note 3:** Through May 2008, \$17,000 has been expended in land preparation and construction and \$38,100 for international and domestic travel for the purpose of assessment and planning and Missionary TECH Team's professional services and training in preparation for a capital fund campaign.

**Note 4:** Through May 2008, pre-campaign gifts and pledges totaling \$101,000 have been received and \$55,100 has been expended (see Note 3 above). The Net of pre-campaign gifts and pledges less expenditures will be used to help cover the above budgeted costs to complete Phase I.
